

"What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people."

John 1:3b-4, NRSV

Most of us are thinking about pumpkins and Thanksgiving right now, but we are just a month away from the beginning of Advent! It won't be long before we'll be seeing Christmas greenery on our neighbors' doors, holiday commercials and movies on television, and Christmas cards in our mailboxes. One of the challenges we face is keeping our focus in the right place during the Advent season. The word "advent" connotes the coming of something important. In the case of our Christian Advent season, we are anticipating the arrival of God incarnated – God, made flesh – in the person of a tiny baby whose name was Jesus. Rather than a time of pre-celebration of Christmas, Advent is meant to be a time of waiting and preparing for the coming of our Lord.

During the month of November, we'll be looking at three gospel stories about people who wanted to see, touch or know Jesus. The first is from Luke's gospel; the story of Zacchaeus, a tax collector despised by his peers but loved and called into repentance by Jesus. The second is Mark's telling of the woman who sought merely to touch the garment of Jesus to receive healing, but who was called out and recognized and blessed by Jesus. The third story is from John's gospel, about a Pharisee who comes under cover of darkness to have a conversation with Jesus.

It's my hope that as we consider these stories of real people who sought and encountered the Jesus who walked among them as God-made-flesh, our hearts will be made more ready for the season of waiting called Advent.








The scent of grilled hotdogs and corndogs filled the air as many community people came and strolled through the shopping areas, enjoying lunch and fellowship.

FINANCE MINISTRY



The parking lot paving project is complete. The bumpers that were used to divide the parking lot sections previously were no longer viable and had to be replaced. The individual parking spaces have been lined to help navigate the new spaces. The table that was damaged near the basketball court will be fixed and ready to accept all of those who enjoy playing on the court very soon.

The 2025 budget has been presented by Finance and approved by the Session at the October 13th, 2024, meeting. This approved budget was a combination of great work between the ministries and the Session.



Hurricane Helene Relief funding thus far has included: \$2000.00 – Helicopter fuel for rescue, supply delivery and recovery.

\$2000.00 – To a diner that provides meals for the victims, and workers such as EMS, Police, Fire and the River Rafting Girls.

\$1900.00 – For plugs, cables, and an electrician to connect homes with generators that will provide needed power for multiple uses.

\$2700.00- to purchase 30 butane camp stoves, fuel canisters and lighters for cooking that will be distributed by a church to the community.

\$1745.00 – To purchase dehumidifiers, damp rid buckets and Carbon Monoxide Detectors for Hospice & Palliative Care of Blue Ridge.

\$10,000 - To Samaritan's Purse

\$5,000 - To Baptist Men on Mission in NC

The funding for this effort comes from a called session meeting on October 6th, 2024, where \$10K was approved from the Barnabus Fund and \$25K was approved from liquid assets. Furthermore, 35% of the proceeds from the Harvest Festival will also be allocated towards the relief fund while the remaining 65% will go to Building and Grounds.




